Schoolwide Program

Goal 1: The percentage of Sierra 7th and 8th grade students able to read at grade level will increase from the previous year. The actions and services in goal 1 are focused on providing students with quality instruction and rigorous ELA curriculum.

Goal 2: The percentage of Sierra 7th and 8th grade students able to perform math at grade level will increase from the previous year.. The actions and services in goal 2 are focused on providing students with quality instruction and rigorous math curriculum.

Goal 3: The percentage of Sierra EL 7th and 8th grade students able to read at grade level will increase from the previous year.. The actions and services in goal 3 are focused on providing students with appropriate instruction and support to maximize learning.

Goal 4: The percentage of students reporting positive responses in Culture on the Youth Truth Survey will increase by 5%. Sierra Middle School uses the Youth Truth Survey to collect information from our school community. The survey collects information from our students, parents, and staff. The greatest need identified for our students was Belonging and School Culture. The parent survey indicated a focus on continued school communication. As a staff we identified the need for a return to academic rigor for students.

## Classroom Observations

Classroom observations and walk through observations are used at Sierra Middle School. Teachers have anywhere from three to six formal observations. Walk through observations that range from five to seven minutes happen approximately every two weeks in each classroom. From these observations it was clear lessons were well planned and students were engaged with learning.

## Standards, Assessment, and Accountability

Use of state and local assessments to modify instruction and improve student achievement (ESEA)

Sierra has used CAASPP and I Ready assessments to help guide our instruction. Less than 30% of students have met or exceeded the standard in math. We have identified this as an area of concern. Our math focus will be having all Sierra math teachers participate in Silicon Valley Math Initiative training, Eight sessions will held through out the year to help with lesson design design, student learning, and student assessment. District Wide Collaboration days will also be focused on math lessons connected to SVMl trainings.

Less than 50% of students have met or exceeded the standard in English Language Arts. Staff will focus on writing strategies across curricular areas.

Use of data to monitor student progress on curriculum-embedded assessments and modify instruction (EPC)

Math teachers are using SVMl training to reshape lessons and develop on-going means of formative assessment to enhance learning.

English Language Arts teachers are using on -going quick writes to give updated feedback to students and using rubrics for larger writing assessments to help guide students through the writing process.

Sierra is meeting the requirements for highly qualified staff.

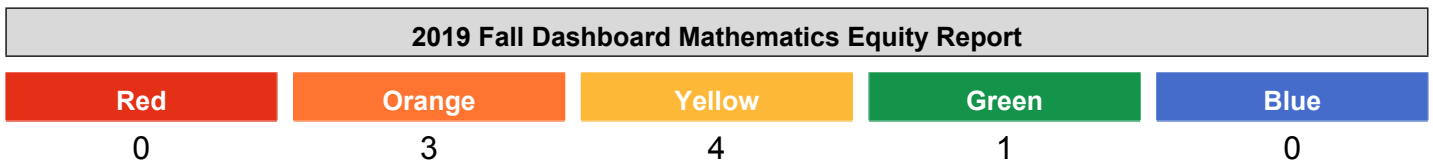

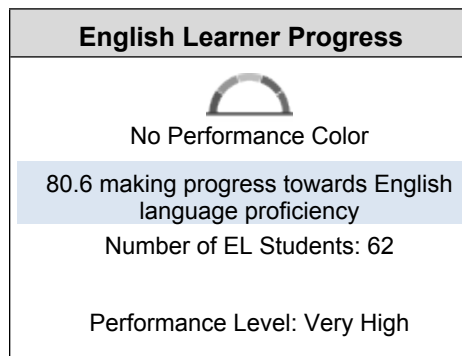

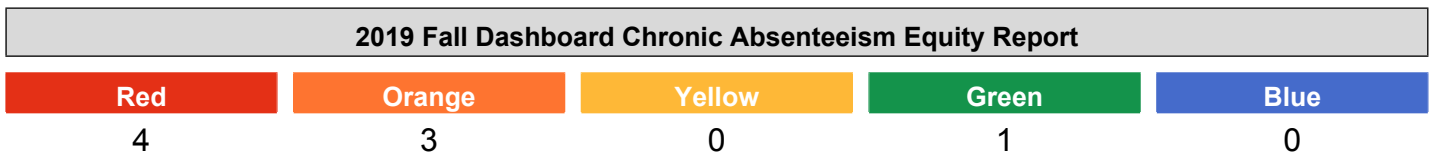

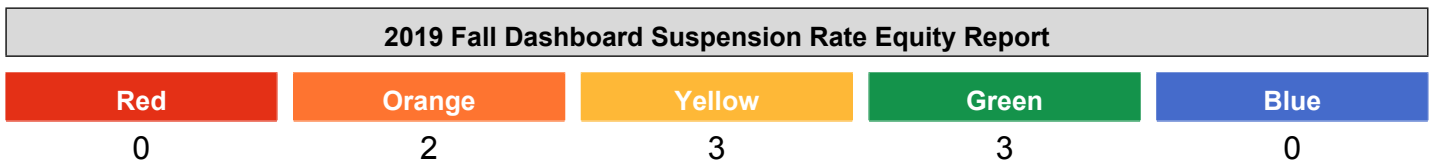

The school may include data voluntarily developed by districts to measure pupil outcomes (described in the Identified Need); and
      - b. Be based on academic achievement information about all students in the school, including all groups under §200.13(b)(7) and migratory children as defined in section 1309(2) of the ESEA, relative to the State's academic standards under §200.1 to—
        - i. Help the school understand the subjects and skills for which teaching and learning need to be improved; and
        - ii. Identify the specific academic needs of students and groups of students who are not yet achieving the State's academic standards; and
        - iii. Assess the needs of the school relative to each of the components of the schoolwide program under §200.28.
        - iv. Develop the comprehensive needs assessment with the participation of individuals who will carry out the schoolwide program plan.
        - v. Document how it conducted the needs assessment, the results it obtained, and the conclusions it drew from those results.
  - B. Identification of the process for evaluating and monitoring the implementation of the SPSA and progress towards accomplishing the goals set forth in the SPSA (described in the Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes and Annual Review and Update).

### Requirements for the Plan

- II. The SPSA shall include the following:
  - A. Goals set to improve pupil outcomes, including addressing the needs of student groups as identified through the needs assessment.

- B. Evidence-based strategies, actions, or services (described in Strategies and Activities)
1. A description of the strategies that the school will be implementing to address school needs, including a description of how such strategies will--
    - a. provide opportunities for all children including each of the subgroups of students to meet the challenging state academic standards
    - b. use methods and instructional strategies that:
      - i. strengthen the academic program in the school,
      - ii. increase the amount and quality of learning time, and
      - iii. provide an enriched and accelerated curriculum, which may include programs, activities, and courses necessary to provide a well-rounded education.
    - c. Address the needs of all children in the school, but particularly the needs of those at risk of not meeting the challenging State academic standards, so that all students demonstrate at least proficiency on the State's academic standards through activities which may include:
      - i. strategies to improve students' skills outside the academic subject areas;
      - ii. preparation for and awareness of opportunities for postsecondary education and the workforce;
      - iii. implementation of a schoolwide tiered model to prevent and address problem behavior;
      - iv. professional development and other activities for teachers, paraprofessionals, and other school personnel to improve instruction and use of data; and
      - v. strategies for assisting preschool children in the transition from early childhood education programs to local elementary school programs.
- C. Proposed expenditures, based on the projected resource allocation from the governing board or body of the local educational agency (may include funds allocated via the ConApp, federal funds for CSI, any other state or local funds allocated to the school), to address the findings of the needs assessment consistent with the state priorities, including identifying resource inequities, which may include a review of the LEAs budgeting, it's LCAP, and school-level budgeting, if applicable (described in Proposed Expenditures and Budget Summary).   - 2. Provide sufficient information on which to base effective assistance to those students.
- G. For an elementary school, a description of how the school will assist preschool students in the successful transition from early childhood programs to the school.
- H. A description of how the school will use resources to carry out these components (described in the Proposed Expenditures for Strategies/Activities).
- I. A description of any other activities and objectives as established by the SSC (described in the Strategies/Activities).

1. Be informed by all state indicators, including student performance against state-determined long-term goals (Goal, Identified Need, Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes, Annual Review and Update, as applicable);
2. ## **Additional Targeted Support and Improvement**

A school identified for ATSI shall:

1. Identify resource inequities, which may include a review of LEA- and school-level budgeting, which will be addressed through implementation of its TSI plan (Goal, Identified Need, Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes, Planned Strategies/Activities, and Annual Review and Update, as applicable).
